 How much would CT need to serve the same number of children at the same level of quality.

To fund the three and four year olds currently enrolled 14,086 in state-funded pre-k programs that meet the current PDG definition of high quality would cost a **total of \$228,714,000**.

The state currently has \$129,416,986 to support state pre-k programs (excluding parent fees, local funds, and PDG). That would mean needing an additional \$99,297,014 to continue to serve the same number of children.
