
Developing State Supports for Coordinated Intake

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Initial Goals

- Use state resources to help communities build strong partnerships
- Empower communities to connect the most at-risk families to high-quality early childhood programs
- Collaboration NOT competition



Coordinated Intake



- Community
 stakeholders
 commit to
 collaboration on:
 - Recruitment
 - Eligibilityscreening
 - Placement



Obstacles and Challenges

- State agencies and systems are in flux
- Communities need infrastructure for collaboration
- Lack of a centralized technical assistance structure for community systems



Obstacles and Challenges



- Lack of understanding about collaboration at the program level
 - Why should we collaborate?
 - How do we collaborate?
 - Won't collaboration keep us from meeting enrollment targets?


Accomplishments

- Focus on sustainable systems, not short-term interventions
